

THE PROTECTION OF UNWANTED PUPPIES SOCIETY (P.U.P.S)

The Protection of Unwanted Puppies society was formed in 1990 following the appearance of an article by the RSPCA in a national newspaper stating that at that time seven thousand dogs per week were being put to sleep as no homes could be found for them.

To try to alleviate the problem in some way **P.U.P.S** was formed with the intention of taking in unwanted puppies, rearing them and ultimately to re-home them to people who would care for them for the rest of their lives, thus they would never become part of the stray dog statistics.

The puppies are mostly hand-reared and all have individual attention from Mrs Sheila Tremellen who cares for them in a home environment. The majority are orphans and many have been abused. Each one is nursed back to health, fully vaccinated, wormed and treated for fleas before leaving.

Viewing is by appointment so that time can be spent with prospective owners. All prospective owners need to be at home for the majority of each day as a puppy needs companionship as well as training. A secure garden is essential.

A set donation is requested to enable the organisation to continue its work. A home check will be made.

Mrs Sheila Tremellen won the **Animal Hospital Viewers Award** as part of the BBC UK Animal Awards in 2002.
In 2006 she was awarded the **MBE** for 'Services to Animal Welfare'.
